1. Executive Summary

- 1.1 The Ageing Well Dashboard for Quarter 3 is presented to Health and Wellbeing Board for information.

The dashboard presents progress against the 10 metrics used to demonstrate performance across the priority areas for the Ageing Well Board. Where performance is below the local target, there is a good understanding of the reasons for this and steps are in place to address the causes.

Report Title: Ageing Well Performance Dashboard Quarter 3

1. Matters for Consideration

The Ageing Well performance dashboard is presented to the Health and Wellbeing Board for information. The metrics used to gauge performance in key areas of the Ageing Well programme are:

1. Percentage of in patients, resident in the HWB, who have been an inpatient in an acute hospital for: i) 14 days or more ii) 21 days or more, as a percentage of all patients
2. Unplanned hospitalisation for chronic ambulatory care sensitive conditions
3. Percentage of people, resident in the HWB area , who are discharged from acute hospital to their normal place of residence
4. Percentage of patients discharged down the D2A pathways
5. Percentage of 2 hour Urgent Community Response (UCR) referrals seen within the month
6. Number of people (aged 65 and over) completing a reablement / ablement package within the month
7. Number of Learning Disabled registered patients who have received an annual health check
8. Number of emergency hospital admissions due to falls in people aged 65 and over
9. Proportion of older people (65 and over) who were still at home 91 days after discharge from hospital into reablement/rehabilitation services
10. Number of citizens newly diagnosed with dementia

Current performance for each and an explanatory narrative are included in the dashboard. Any questions on individual metrics should be addressed to the lead officer noted in the dashboard.

The metrics will continue to be monitored by the Health and Care Commissioning Group, and report through Ageing Well Board projects on the schemes contributing to each.

- 2.1 Detailed reporting takes place monthly on the workstreams and projects under the Ageing Well Programme. The dashboard summarises the impact on the metrics, and will be taken by the Ageing Well Board to steer continued investment and action to improve performance and outcomes.
